Rabbi's Corner -- What's Wrong with the Bar/Bat Mitzvah?

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A 13-year old Bar Mitzvah boy in Dallas recently made headlines. In a strident article in the *Washington Post*, Rabbi David Wolpe criticized the burlesque-themed Bar Mitzvah party thrown for the young man, whom he identified as "Sammy."

"To turn a ceremony of spiritual maturation into a Vegas showgirl parade teaches a child sexualization of spirit. Apparently nothing in our society militates against the narcissistic display of short skirted dancers ushering an adolescent into unearned stardom," Wolpe wrote.

He continued with a rhetorical question, "I am leery of being too maudlin but really, our ancestors struggled and suffered and fasted and prayed so Sammy could cavort?"

Wolpe's article went viral (at least among the community of Jewish professionals!), as we asked ourselves about the propriety of Bnei Mitzvah celebrations in our communities.

I agree with Wolpe's central point. Some Bnei guage, among the worst transgressions.

Mitzvah celebrations go too far. The purpose of becoming a Bar or Bat Mitzvah is not to throw a big party. It is to read and teach Torah. It is to assert and celebrate one's Jewish identity. It is to begin to take responsibility for our spiritual lives. When we confuse the party with the purpose, we teach the wrong lessons.

Yet, what bothered me about Wolpe's article was its vituperative tone and singling out of one young man by name. It felt mean-spirited and condescending toward a thirteen yearold-boy.

"Poor Sammy," Wolpe wrote. "What remains to him of the small triumphs of life? When he struggles with math and earns a 'B' when before he could never do better than a 'C' will they purchase an island to mark the occasion? Will he take Air Force One to his prom?"

Is such personal humiliation necessary? Jewish law considers *lashon harah*, malicious language, among the worst transgressions.



Cantor Glikin's Desk-- Return Again

Once upon a time, in a far-away land, there lived a Prince. The Prince was very adventurous and he spent many years traveling all over the world, to places that were far, far away from his home and the home of his ancestors. Then, one day, the Prince felt homesick and decided to return. For a moment, the Prince felt shame...he had been away for so long. Will he even be recognized in his home town? But, then, he said to himself: "I must not be ashamed to return! After all, it is to my own home, to my own ancestral inheritance that I am returning."

So it is with us. No matter how far removed we might feel from Torah and our Jewish heritage, it remains our possession. It is ours to claim. Each of us has our own portion in the Torah that belongs to us. When we take up the study of Torah, when we explore our Jewish roots, we are coming home.

The book of Deuteronomy describes Torah as a heritage that is rightfully ours: "Moses charged us with this Teaching (Torah) as the heritage of the congregation of Jacob." The Talmud goes even further, remarking that a teacher who withholds even a single verse of Torah from his students is robbing them of their rightful possessions. The Torah, is ours – it is mine and yours – to come to and to claim whenever we are ready to do so.

On S'lichot, we sang: "Return again, return again, return to the land of your soul. Return to who you are, return to what you are, return to where you are born and reborn and reborn." The sentiment of the High Holiday season is that of returning. T'shuva – the Hebrew word most often translated as "repentance" – is rooted in the word "lashuv," which means "to return." Thus, the very act of repentance is seen in Judaism as a return – a return to better versions of ourselves, a return to what is truly important, a return to Torah and our Jewish roots, a return home.

The gates of T'shuva are open to all. The Jewish month of Elul, which is quickly coming to an end, is seen in our tradition as an opportune time to return to what truly matters to us on the deepest possible level. May each of us feel called to come home this year, to return to who and what *we* are, and to feel truly reborn into higher versions of ourselves. Shana Tova – may you and your loved ones be inscribed for a good year!

From Our President --

Recently, with a gentle prod from Rabbi Moffic, I read *Ben-Gurion, A Political Life* (Shocken, 2011). Its author is Shimon Peres, the president of Israel. Peres previously served as the minister of defense and twice as prime minister; save for a brief interruption, his service in the Knesset spanned sixty-six years. He also won a Nobel Peace Prize for his efforts to bring about the Oslo Peace Accords of 1993. Another virtue of *Ben-Gurion* is that it runs just over two-hundred pages!

Notably Shimon Peres published *Ben-Gurion* at age eighty-nine, a fact that impresses me to no end. Obviously this octogenarian has composed, to borrow a trope from Mary Catherine Bateson, a meaningful and long-lasting life. (If you have not come across Bateson's wonderful book *Composing a Life* [1989], I recommend it highly. I read it over twenty years ago and think about it regularly.)

I found *Ben-Gurion* – the book as well as the man -- enthralling. I think I first learned about him, circa 1950, while attending Hebrew school. To this very day he symbolizes the very embodiment of Israel's inception. Not unlike Franklin Delano Roosevelt, the longest serving American president, Prime Minister Ben-Gurion also tenaciously endured. I consider myself blessed that earlier this year I stood before his austere grave site at *Sde Boker* in the Negev. *Ben-Gurion*, the book, filled in numerous blank spaces in my knowledge of Israel and the decades which preceded its independence. I also relished what Shimon Peres shared in his narrative about his own, longtime relationship with Ben-Gurion.

So – justifiably – you might wonder where does Congregation Solel fit into all of this? As professor of history for thirty-eight years, I always have wanted to learn about the origins of places and things. I had a wonderful teacher whom I listened to attentively. His name was Herman Edwards, who served as our congregation's first president (1957-1959). He was blessed to live a very long life (1900-1991). I had the great good fortune, upon moving to the Midwest, to sustain a long friendship with Herman that I cherish. It was rooted in his love of learning as well as his longtime devotion to our congregation. As an aside, he also knew a good deal about where to dine (e.g., Max & Benny's, The Bagel, and Capriccio's). Most of all, Herman shared with me wonderful narratives about Solel. Among the most memorable: the urgency attached to establishing a Religious School; the fierce debate over the selection of chairs for our sanctuary; protracted debates about worship; wonderful stories about Rabbi Arnold Jacob Wolf; the virtues of lay leadership; and why presidents

of our congregation only hold the office for only two years. Herman also told me that one of his children once had inquired why the family didn't belong to a country club. With a twinkle he related to me his succinct response: "We belong to Solel." And there is a delicious coda to the last anecdote: both Larry Edwards and Lisa Edwards became rabbis!

As we prepare to enter our much-transformed sanctuary on Erev Rosh Hashanah, each of us – individually and collectively – have much to contemplate about the past, present, and future. Do remember the lives and lessons of Israel's David Ben-Gurion and Solel's Herman Edwards. They furnish us with a source of inspiration that enable us to shape our own lives and experiences.

We need to be extraordinarily careful with our words. Even if we apologize (which Wolpe has done), we cannot erase them.

Words are like feathers. An old Jewish folk story tells of a man who sought to make amends as he neared the end of his life. He recalled many of the awful words he had said to those he loved. He asked his rabbi what he needed to do.

The rabbi instructed him to place a bag of feathers in front of the homes of each person he had hurt with his words. The man did so. He felt good. It seemed like an easy way to make amends.

Then the rabbi told him to go out and retrieve every feather he had placed in front of each home. The man turned white. "That's impossible," he said. "They have flown off around the world. There is no way I can get them all."

"So it is with our words," responded the rabbi. "They spread out like feathers, and we can do nothing to get them back."

We need to be extra-careful with the words we say. "Life and death," King Solomon reminded us, "lies in the power of the tongue."


Solel Volunteers Help Make Nuestro Center's Gran Fiesta A Yummy, Hopping, Neighing Success

The goal is to engage parents and grandparents in a subject their children and grandchildren have already embraced, by having become student chapter members of GLOBAL ZERO.
